Nasser Karim al-Sudani, head of the national team for solar energy projects in the Iraqi prime minister's office, said another project under construction in Babil province will have a capacity of 225 megawatts, and work will also begin soon on a 1,000-megawatt project in the southern province of Basra.

<div class="df_qntext">How much solar power will Iraq have in 2025?

The country has a plan to install 12 gigawatts of solar capacity by 2030, according to the ministry of electricity, which includes delivering a 1 GW solar plant for Basra this year. Peak summer demand in 2025, meanwhile, is expected to reach 55 GW, while supply stands at just 27 GW, according to estimates by Iraq's electricity minister in January.

<div class="df_qntext">Will Iraq buy Iranian natural gas to feed its power plants?

The US has, for now, left another waiver in place that lets Iraq buy Iranian natural gas to feed its power plants. Iran is also facing multiple crises, including massive energy shortages, an issue that has affected its exports to Iraq.
